For over 140 years, the Sisters of Saint Francis of Rochester, Minnesota, have pledged themselves to be faithful to the call of God and to each other.

- In 1877, Sister Mary Alfred Moes (shown below), along with her birth sister, Sister Barbara Moes, and 23 other Franciscan Sisters from Joliet, Illinois, came to Rochester, Minnesota, to establish a new community of Franciscan Sisters ready to serve as teachers.
- In 1883, Rochester was hit by a devastating tornado. The Franciscan Sisters provided care for the victims. Seeing the necessity for health

founded what would become the College of Saint Teresa in Winona, Minnesota. After the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965), many Sisters entered into areas of social service, spiritual care and service abroad. Others continued their ministries in health care and education.
